From Pastor Corinne

Dear Peace Church,

Though my spouse and I are not parenting purists in any philosophy, we are fascinated by Montessori parenting resources lately. The overarching philosophy, quoting from the American Montessori Society's website, is to "view children as naturally eager and capable of initiating and pursuing learning, guided by their own interests." The language of "work" permeates Montessori materials, as everything children do is part of their work of becoming relational, capable people with learning to do and gifts to share.

I find myself falling back on Montessori ideas in this moment we are facing as a country. It can feel overwhelming to watch or read the news, see the litany of executive orders, or scroll through a social media feed. If ever I start to feel this way. I remember the way a colleague of mine described her Montessori parenting style: "These are your shoes. You are responsible for tying them." Inherent in this statement are two assumptions: the first is that we all have work we are called to do, and the second is that all work is not ours to do. We cannot abdicate our shoetying with the assumption that someone else will do it for us. Nor should we be tying everyone else's shoes for them. That's a quick route to burnout and resentment

I am compelled by the words of Paul to the church in Corinth, here quoted in 1 Corinthians 12:12, "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ." We are called to be the body of Christ, always and in all times! And that means that some of us are eyes, and some are toes, and some are beating hearts, and some are breathing lungs. Our shared future depends on each one of us thriving. We tie our own shoes. We ensure our neighbors have what they need to tie theirs. We seek to be the body of Christ not just with those we agree with, but with everyone, because though many, we are strengthened when we become one. Looking forward to our becoming this month as we continue our 1:1 conversations. move church processes forward, and prepare for Lent, starting in March.

New Security System

Duluth Technology Systems is finished the installation of our new security cameras and door access keypads. **Starting January 28**th, **the entrances to the church will be locked** as often as possible for the safety of our staff and people in the building. We understand this is a big change and may feel like a change in attitude from our usual open-door policy. The Coordinating Council and staff made this decision because:

- Our building is heavily used and we need to standardize access for members, outside groups, and church groups.
- We have welcomed vulnerable young people next door and this system protects their safety and privacy.
- Our staff demographics and schedules risk unsafe situations when, as is often the case, we only have one staff person in the office.
- We are proud to be out front about our Christian values of love, compassion, and justice, which has at times drawn protest and controversy to our doors.

The doors will continue to be open as normal on Sunday mornings and Wednesday evenings, as well as for large events. However, if you're visiting the church during the week, you will need to use a code or ring the doorbell to be let in.

What does this entail? Electronic locks with touchpads and video/sound are installed at the lower-level exterior door near the kitchen and the main front door inside the vestibule. All church members and small group members regularly using the building will be able to enter a 4-digit code to unlock the door for themselves.

This code will be active Mondays-Thursdays 9am-8pm. Press the 'PIN Unlock' icon at the very bottom of the keypad, enter the code, and open the door or use the automatic door opener.

Having trouble or forget the code? You can also press and hold the doorbell icon on the keypad and our office staff will remotely unlock the door for you (during office hours only). The code will be published in the regular weekly emails and will be sent out in group meeting email reminders. Don't hesitate to ask us to show you in-person as well!

Do you need access to the church outside of these hours? Reach out to the office and we will give you a unique code for after-hours access.

If you have any questions, please reach out to rachel@peaceucc.org or call the office. We appreciate your patience as we all get used to this new system and hope that this upgrade brings an added sense of security to our building.



The topic of this

Yet citizens in our region's rural. urban, and tribal lands also care deeply about climate change and its affects. Researchers can tap into this energy through participatory science projects that are mutually beneficial, especially if there is equitable representation of local communities in terms of age, socioeconomic status, and racial identity. The goal of this conference is to facilitate community conversations that lead to equitable participatory science projects and produce impactful adaptation and mitigation action.

Children, Youth and Families

Hello Peace Families,

Well, what a week! Norovirus and extreme low temperatures! The cognitive dissonance of hopeful festivities for Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. day and ominous threats during the Inauguration. The relief of an Israel-Hamas ceasefire, the anxiety over whether it will last and the grief over the destruction and enormous loss of Palestinian civilian life. News of wildfires in CA and the US exit from the Paris Climate Agreement. Numerous executive orders that endanger immigrants, Trans folks, DEI, prescription drug costs, end the US relationship with WHO, and pardoned insurrectionists. A plea for Mercy from a national pulpit and a rebuff. How is everyone holding up?

Of course, I am writing to you this third week of January, which if we are honest with ourselves, we knew would look bleak. Here's the good news, we got through this week, and now the job is to look ahead. As I do, I'm asking myself the question that I imagine many of you are asking yourselves, what do we do next?

In Middle School Youth this week, we were finishing up a growth mindset tool, a "2025 Idea Lab" journal to reflect on our last year and imagine what we want this next year to look like. There was a discussion about one page called "My Natural Talents and True Passions." On this page many activities are listed, and you check statements that describe you like "I am a good listener," "I'm great with animals," or "I enjoy solving puzzles." One of the statements was "I love dancing," and a couple of students said they are not "good" dancers. "But do you enjoy dancing?" I asked. I shared with the youth that I am also not a "good" dancer, but that pretty often I still put in earbuds, turn on a favorite music mix, and dance in my kitchen like nobody's watching. Except for the dog, lol, he's always watching.

And why do I do that? Because it brings me joy! It's a mind-body-somatic release. It's a way to create a Glimmer – a small moment of peace and joy that reminds me that life is good, that sparks positive feelings and cues my nervous system to relax. It is a way to build resilience. I have quoted the poet, Toi Derricotte before who has said, "Joy is an act of resistance." And our God is big on joy.

One thing we talk about a lot in Children's Church, Kid's Club, Youth Group ,and Confirmation Classes – we worship a God who takes the impossible stuff in life and makes goodness possible. I think to keep going when things seem impossible, you have to be big on joy. You have to be committed to embracing and celebrating moments of joy when they find you, and also to create moments of joy when it's nowhere to be found.

So, what do we do next? Retired Episcopal bishop and citizen of the Choctaw nation of Oklahoma, Steven Charleston, said recently "When things feel like they are happening too fast, the elders suggest slowing down your reactions to them. Leaping forward to respond to every new reality can wear you out. Practice mindfulness. You will know when and how to act when your response will have an impact. Do not lose your sense of balance. Choose your own time and place."

The work of justice and creating a world of love – the very work of God – is a for-the-long-haul type of deal. We were already doing this kind of work; it is no surprise that it continues. Each day, as Gwen Walz suggests, we will do the work that is in front of us. We will practice mindfulness, we will look for Glimmers, and we will create Glimmers for our young people.

We worship a God who takes the impossible stuff and makes goodness possible. With a God like that all things are possible! We know that our God loves justice, mercy and kindness. And we walk into this new year, as we have every other year - praising God, living the Way of Jesus, and building the Beloved Community.

In the meantime, our staff is beginning to put together a resource list to give out that will help our Peace community to know how to help, and to know which community organizations can help, when you encounter vulnerable folks in our community who are in direct need.

One major way that you can help young people, as a volunteer at Peace, is to be trained as a Facilitator to lead OWL classes for 9th graders. This work is more relevant than ever. Every young person who goes through OWL also becomes a resource for their peers for accurate information about consent, bodily autonomy, reproductive health, empathy and equity. We particularly need male-identifying facilitators. If you would like to volunteer to be a facilitator for OWL please let me know and we will find training for you!
